#### First 5 vision

All babies' and young children's early years will be valued as a critical and distinct period which should be enjoyed. Families will be assisted and enabled to nurture babies and young children and support their development, with additional support for those who need it. Those providing services for babies, young children and their families will be equipped to contribute to their learning, development, health and wellbeing. Community contexts will help babies and young children make the most of their early years and

fulfil their potential.

#### Vision for EY Educators

- An appropriately skilled and sustainable professional workforce that is supported and valued and reflects the diversity of babies, young children and their families.' (First 5)
- A well-qualified, skilled, diverse and valued professional workforce that is centred on children's rights, needs and potential and that provides quality experiences for children in partnership with families, and which continues to advance its professional development within a coherent and competent system (Nurturing

Skills)



## Nurturing Skills

- Training will support staff in mentoring, coordination, empowering, leading practice with co-professionals
- Consideration to further development of roles of additional responsibility across a setting, building on the existing model of 'Inclusion Coordinator' within AIM, may include responsibility for mentoring and supporting co-professionals in the setting in an area of practice, including family and community partnership, leading and supporting partnership and engagement between families and the setting.



### **Funding Model**

- Develop a DEIS-type model for the delivery of ELC and SAC in the context of concentrated disadvantage, and to pilot the delivery of parenting programmes through ELC and SAC settings

Research in UK (Cottle and Alexander, 2014) suggests that although practitioners considered parent partnership to be essential element in quality early years services, partnerships understood and enacted in very different ways. Perceptions of the parents greatly influenced by normative policy discourses which tend to position parents as either deficient or as active agents and oversimplify highly complex relationships which are imbued with issues of class and
